### PAVILION GROUNDS

### BLUE SPRING PUMP

The pump has been restored and repaired and now stands again in its rightful place at the top of Church Road opposite Drakewell Road. The pump was the original water supply for dwellings in Church Road; over the years it became damaged and was looked after by Alan and Mary Preene for several years. The Parish Council have been able to restore the pump with part funding from the Parish Partnership Fund (MKC) which offer financial support for community groups and projects.



### PARISH FUNDING APPLICATIONS 2003

The Parish Council have been successful in gaining part funding through the Parish Partnership Fund this year for a new cooker and fridge at the Pavilion and monies towards providing a new football strip for the Bow Brickhill Football Club.

### SID

Bow Brickhill is part of the Speed Check Campaign run by Milton Keynes Council and the Police. As we are members of this scheme the village is provided with regular visits from the mobile speed detectors and posters alerting drivers to maintain the speed limit. We have also recently been selected to be a SID trial site. Hopefully you have met SID and he has smiled at you! – If this was the case then you will be pleased to hear that you were within the village speed limit. SID detects the speed of vehicles on their approach to the mobile monitor and the vehicle speed is flashed up on the screen with a smile or a frown. The system has so far been located in three positions within the village and proved to have a very positive effect.

## Local Wildlife Trust

We have received some more information about the local wildlife trust which looks after wildlife in Bucks, Berks and Oxon. (known as BBOWT).

BBOWT has 90 reserves in the three counties, many of which offer some very exciting flora and fauna. One example is the breeding colony of dormice in Linford Wood to the north of Milton Keynes. The new guidebook gives superb information including colour and aerial photographs of all the major reserves. There is an active Wildlife Watch club for children which offers children their own Wildlife magazine and the chance to join the local club. To join the Club, the Trust offers family membership and cost is based on whatever the family feels they can afford.

Dear Friends,

"Unless I see . . . "

July 3rd is the day when the church remembers St. Thomas, and it seems to me that he is in some ways a very modern kind of saint.

He is often referred to as 'doubting Thomas', because he had a questioning attitude to what other people told him, and he wanted to see and experience things for himself.

You can read more about him in the Bible, in Chapter 20 of the gospel of John. He was absent when the risen Jesus appeared to a group of his disciples, and Thomas was not satisfied with just accepting what they told him they had seen and heard. He wanted to be able to see and touch the risen Jesus for himself.

A week later the same group gathered, and this time Thomas was with them. He saw and met the risen Jesus for himself, and then he believed.

Thomas can be a useful example for us, because he reminds us that there is nothing wrong with having honest doubts and questions, if that is part of a sincere search for truth. In recent years many churches have discovered the importance of giving time and attention to people's questions and searching, and providing opportunities for questions and open discussion. The Alpha course, and other courses and meetings, can offer that opportunity in our local churches.

Thomas brought his doubts and questions to Jesus, and found the answer to his questions in the experience of meeting the risen Jesus face to face. If we bring our doubts and questions to God, we may find that the same thing happens to us.

Jesus said, "Then you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free." (John Ch. 8, v. 32)
